Context – My starting point

Online unit delivery development

I was provided:

- Unit overview, learning outcomes (ULOs)
- Weekly key topic

My tasks:

- sub-topics, interactives, case studies etc
- online content (no textbooks to be purchased)
- session plans & tutorial activities
- Pass to L&D team for site development

Used ChatGPT to structure 6 to 8 key topics for each week

- the following reflects on developing the content

Principle 1 – Retain the executive function

GPT 4.0 Prompt -

'Jabberwocky Gibberish!'

'Suggest 10 titles for an in-service session on AI

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Principle 2 – Use the tone knob

Set the tone and purpose for what is to follow.

Example prompt

'You are an Australian university academic writing the content for selfdirected learning via online unit delivery. Write in a semi formal tone but be warm and friendly. Directly address the student by using 'you' instead of we or third person. Your fields of expertise are This course is for students as the level of studies. Use Australian spelling.'

PRO – Almost always kept to this tone – occasionally had to edit to use 'you'

CON – Almost never uses the correct spelling

Principle 3 – Chunk it up

Example prompt

'Describe and academically discuss the following topic. Risk management in projects. **Write up to 600 words**. Integrate any important alternative perspectives or any important multicultural perspectives. Emphasise how a few cultures do not readily speak about risk and explain why.'

Variants – write between 300 to 400, no more than 300 etc

PRO – I found 400 good for shorter text plus truncated lists and over 600 usually caused system issues

CON – The final 100 was usually used up in a summary paragraph

Principle 4 – Prompt for analysis

Example prompt

'**Describe and academically discuss** the following topic. 4.1 Project life cycle. Write up to 600 words introducing and explaining the lifecycle from ideas to post-implementation.'

'Provide more detail on what is different about agile life cycles. **Explain the concepts** of iteration and incremental. **Discuss any tensions or conflicts** that may exist when adopting a non-traditional lifecycle.'

PRO – I found this greatly elevated the quality of the content and enabled me to shape it more towards the unit and assessment objectives.

CON – You may need to tweak to ensure cohesion – revisit your intro

Principle 5 – Keep it together

Example prompt

'Repeat but refer back to the last 4 topics and build internal cohesion'

'... Begin by reminding students of the definition of SDGs and ESG. Flag to students that this topic is covered in more depth in UNIT 1234.'

PRO – I found rather good when I ask it to include cohesion or cross-referencing

CON – This does not occur unprompted even when you have explained you are writing parts of a whole.



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Principle 6 – Bias and skewed representation

Example prompts

'change the example in the second paragraph to policing and correctional services'

'provide an example using Australian Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander perspectives'

'change the first two examples to female thought leaders'

'suggest 5 examples from different contexts or industries'

PRO – Was able to accommodate swiftly when prompted to adapt

CON – There was a tendency to use US centric case and Finance, Technology and IT industry examples (or common examples for the context).



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Principle 7 – Copy & paste ... Often!

TIP

Frequently copy the output and paste into your own document

Why

Freezing or system issues, especially after a slightly complex prompt, meant the loss of the session. Great previous output had to be re-created.

Principle 8 – Beware the citation vortex

'... include citations and references'

GPT 3.5 - rarely accurate and wasted time looking for false or misleading citations and then replacing with suitable sources.

GPT 4.0 – almost always accurate but not always the most accessible

- time taken to find the source, verify it, ensure it was one the uni library has access to etc.

- I stopped asking for citations and did that stage the old (ish) school way



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Principle 9 – List it

Example prompt

'List 20 examples of project risks''List another 10 but include diverse industry and organisational scale''Suggest 10 interactive tutorial ideas for this topic'

List more than you need and select or modify the most suitable ones

PRO – Fast generation of examples that can be used or inspire

CON – Often starts with generic or common ideas and needs to be prompted to move beyond that



Principle 10 – Repeat that, but

Example prompt

'Repeat that but emphasise the role of cognitive psychology'

PRO – Ability to introduce any kind of addition or emphasis

CON – Best done straight after the GPT response – need to analyse immediately (but this can be worked around)

Eg read the following text and then re-write to emphasise (include, exclude etc)



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
Principle 11 – Self analysis – both of us

Example prompt

'Read the attached file [the document with all of the module from objectives through to summary] and suggest any ideas that may be missing or ways to improve this module'

Self prompt

Review for flow, tone, concept coverage, sufficient examples, further readings, additional interactive activities, sufficient variety, etc. Is there unintended bias or other elements that need enhancing?

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ChatGPT 4.0 feedback trial – Key Points

Full disclosure with students

- Students were informed assessment guide and during Live Session
- Students were shown examples of how I used ChatGPT and the output
- Students were asked for their thoughts on the feedback
- Students were asked to add further comments to the Unit Survey
